President's Note

Excerpts from the 2007 State of the HOA Address on September 13, 2007

The current Board of directors was installed on October 3, 2006. At that time I was elected to be the new President. I had several goals that I wanted to institute as the leader. Then, as a group we decided on several broader goals for the HOA.

My first goal was to run Board meetings and HOA meeting according to Roberts Rules of order as is preferred in our by-laws. To make this happen we have educated ourselves on this process; we are becoming more efficient in it.

We reviewed old minutes and reflected on our past experiences in Longs Pond Estates to develop the goals for the year. The other goals we adopted were:

- 1. To set a higher precedent on the handling of the affairs of the HOA
- 2. To make the activities of the Board and the HOA as transparent as possible
- 3. Improve Communication
- 4. Beautify Common Areas
- 5. Develop New Committees

As far as setting a new precedent, we accomplished that goal by using Roberts Rules of Order. We are a small non-profit business and we should conduct our affairs in a businesslike manner.

Communication has been a concern and a complaint of nearly everyone in the neighborhood. We addressed this issue in three ways. We have started quarterly news letters. We are improving communication through the website. It is a very efficient way for anyone to retrieve information about our neighborhood. On that website you can read minutes from board meet-

ings and HOA meetings. We have made the activities of the Board transparent and accessible to the extent that resident confidentiality and sensitive matters are not compromised. You can access forms and documents. Most recently we have added the By-laws and Covenants for your easy review.

The third way we are working on communication is by having quarterly HOA meetings. We are making a concerted effort to make these meetings informative and organized. Our HOA meetings are meant to be a time for sharing information and exchanging ideas. There will usually be a time in HOA meetings for discussion and constructive debate. I feel it is important for any and all members to feel they have a forum where they can speak to the directors.

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We have also accomplished beautifying some of the common areas. We have installed landscape lighting. We are looking toward adding additional lighting and plantings in the near future.

To help us along in our goals, we have solicited volunteers for different committees. I am thrilled at the response. Tina Turnage headed up the Vacant Lot Development with a rather large group of people. We have a Welcoming Committee. This is headed up by Debbie Kessel. Lora Prill has volunteered to chair the Communications Committee. And, Marvin Parsons is the Chair of the Architectural Review Committee.

If you are willing to work on any of these committees please contact one of the Board Members.

So this is self evaluation time for me and for the Board. Have we met our goals? I think we have. Do we have room to improve? Certainly we do. Is life as a whole, better in Long's Pond Estates? I think it is. Our association has been on a steep learning curve since it was turned over by the developers to the residents. It has been a tough transition time for the residents and the various board members that we have had in the last five years. We have done

many good things over the last year and you have helped. We want to continue this momentum and we want you to join us. We are available and we have an open ear. Come talk to us. The state of the HOA is good. The state of the HOA is strong.

What's Down There?

All of the homes in Longs Pond Estates use self contained residential sewer systems. This type waste disposal system has been in existence for hundreds of years and is a very effective and efficient way of neutralizing human waste.

This type of sewer system is composed of four components; the fixtures inside the home, the septic tank buried in the yard, the drain field in the yard and the plumbing that connects the system together. For the most part since the system is unseen, people generally do not think about it until some part of it fails. But just because it cannot be seen does not mean it should be forgotten or ignored. There are things that we should do to maintain it to keep it working properly.

The first consideration is what goes into the system. Obviously solid and liquid human waste products dump into the septic system. But also bath and kitchen water, laundry and cleaning water and garbage disposal food products also go in it. Under normal conditions a septic tank can handle all of this. If a system is overloaded with detergents, chemicals, and fats it puts an undue burden and possibly kills the microbes that naturally break down solids.

The largest volume that goes into the system is liquid. If too much liquid enters the tank there is not enough exposure time for the bacteria to do its work. Once the waste enters the septic tank the solids drift to the bottom, floating scum and sludge rise to the top, and the liquids exit the through a series of pipes into the drain field that allows it to soak back into the ground. As some of the solids break down and liquefy, they eventually make their way into drain field as well. Some solids, like fats, will not breakdown. Eventually the tank has to be pumped out by a septic service to remove excess solids, scum, sludge and liquid.

What can you do to help your system?

- First of all use septic friendly soaps and detergents. Feed your bacteria do not kill it or over burden it.
- Secondly use water wisely. This is good on many levels. It does not over work the drain field. It does not dilute the bacterial flora. It conserves water. It saves you and the public water system money and a valuable natural resource. Do not load your system with large volumes of water at one time, like draining a hot tub or doing large amounts of laundry at one time.
- Use paper products that decompose quickly.
- Use your garbage disposal wisely. Grinding small bones and fruit pits have a scouring and cleaning action on the blades. Citrus peels have a freshening effect. Use cold water when using your disposal.
- ◆ Do not use septic additives. These contain yeast, enzymes, degreasers, or commercially derived bacteria. These products destroy the bacterium that is naturally occurring.
- Do not flush feminine hygiene products, dental floss, cigarette butts, coffee grounds, or cat litter. Do not flush any petroleum or paint products, pesticides, old medications or plastic.

The experts and SC DHEC recommend inspection and pumping of septic tanks every three to five years. Since most the homes in Long's Pond Estates were finished about three years ago, it is time to consider this for your home. A little attention to this quiet, diligent worker will serve you well now and should last you well into the future. Do not ignore this very important part of your home.
